About this Podcast & Activities

GENERAL DESCRIPTION:

The Hank the Cowdog Podcast is a fun way to engage students in studying fiction and the mystery genre! In this educational packet you'll find everything you need to begin your classroom exploration. It includes directions for group discussions, concise summaries of chapters, and sheets to record story elements. Students will learn how to use strategies to figure out unknown vocabulary words, as well as how to formulate questions while listening to the story. In addition to reading and comprehension, this packet includes activities to involve students in helping to analyze clues that are presented throughout the story.

GRADE LEVEL: 3 - 5

INTRODUCTION:

Lost in the Dark Unchanted Forest by John R. Erickson is in the mystery genre and features themes of loyalty, friendship and belonging. The podcast script is written by Jeff Nichols.

The Podcast is based on Book 11 in the Hank the Cowdog Book Series

BACKGROUND:

Hank the Cowdog leads a motley crew of West Texas ranch characters through a series of hilarious adventures. When he's not patrolling the ranch, he spends his time soaking in Emerald Pond (the septic tank) or sleeping on his gunny sack bed under the gas tank. Here, from the very first Hank story ever, Hank tells readers how he thinks of himself and his job: "When I took this job as Head of Ranch Security, I knew that I was only flesh and blood, four legs, a tail, a couple of ears, a pretty nice kind of nose that the women really go for, two bushels of hair and another half-bushel of sandburs. You add that up and you don't get Superman, just me, good old easy-going Hank who works hard, tries to do his job, and gets very little cooperation from anyone else around here." In Lost in the Dark Unchanted Forest, which is the eleventh book in the Hank the Cowdog series, Hank has to save a little boy. When Little Alfred runs away from home and winds up in the Dark Unchanted Forest being trailed by a bobcat, Hank the Cowdog knows that it's up to him to save his young master. So, mustering up all the courage that the Head of Ranch Security can come up with, he bravely makes his way into the forest. But before long, Hank is even more lost than Alfred. Can he find his master and get them both out of the woods? Or is he destined to pass the rest of his days going in circles?
